The Waiting Game



If you thought that veto-proof Democratic control of the State Senate and House of Representatives would be a good thing for labor issues, boy oh boy, have our elected officials got news for you! Seems

like any time there's a pro-labor bill on the legislative agenda, the CBIA (CT Business and Industry Association) summons their lobbying buzzards to descend upon the Capitol and squawk about how "bad these bills are for Connecticut business". Our jittery legislators run as fast as they can back to their cushy chamber seats to press their quivering fingers on the big red "NO" button.

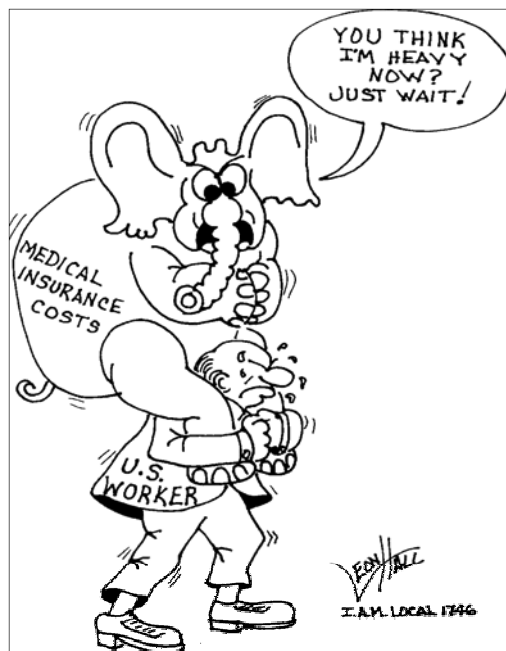
A bill to improve **Workers Compensation**, a bill to stop mandatory anti-labor "**captive audiences**" meetings at work, one to require companies with 50 or more employees to provide **sick leave**, and a bill to study how **out-sourcing** impacts on Connecticut families all fell by the wayside. The CBIA's blaring message prevailed: "**Workers interests are bad for Connecticut businesses**". Despite holding a **veto-proof majority** in both houses, the pathetic Dems tucked their tails between their legs and failed to over-ride Governor Rell's veto of their own income tax bill, to cut taxes for 95% of Connecticut Taxpayers.

Even universal health care, supported by a large majority of state residents (84%), died a shameful political death. Conspicuously missing from the Connecticut General Assembly's list of bills passed were S.B. 1371 (single-payer reform) and HB 7314 (large-pool reform), both of which would have paved the way for universal health care. Neither bill ever made it through the quagmire of legislative commit-

tees. Instead what we got was S.B. 1484, a hastily-concocted, face-saving measure that increases HUSKY enrollment and Medicaid income limits--but which remains a far cry from universal health care. The only silver-lining in the bill is the establishment of an Authority with a labor representative to recommend a universal health care plan for the *next* session. **Don't hold your breath waiting**, especially if you don't have health insurance: ***you might pass out, hit your head, and lose your house from paying your medical bills.***

Juan Figueroa, president of the Universal Health Care Foundation of CT, stressed the grassroots effort to tackle the health care crisis wasn't in vain. "*What the Governor and legislature missed, **the people of Connecticut got.** People from around the state put aside their differences and united around the common goal of building a just, coherent, and sustainable system of health care for our state... **Connecticut can't afford to wait.***"

For now we have to wait. But rest assured, the issue will be back in 2008 in the glaring spotlight of a presidential election. Until then, it's time to let our legislators know how disappointed we are in their performance, in our letters and phone calls as well as at the election booth next November. The politicians may be packing for *(Cont.- page 2)*

CBTU 36th International Convention-2007

I would like to thank Local 1746 for sending me to Chicago for the 36th International Convention of the Coalition of Black Trade Unionists (CBTU), held from May 23-28.

William Lucy, President of the CBTU presided over the convention. The long list of invited speakers included: Linda Chavez, AFL-CIO Vice-President; Larry Cohen, President of the Communication Workers Union (CWA); Gerald McEntee, President of AFSCME; and Congressman Bennie Thompson (Mississippi).

Keynote speaker was Senator Barack Obama, (D-IL) who is also a 2008 presidential candidate. The Senator stated that we need to end the war in Iraq, which is not winnable, and is costing billions of dollars that could be better spent meeting the needs of our citizens at home. If elected, he promised to do everything in his power to ensure that every American has adequate healthcare for themselves and their families. He also strongly supports the rights of workers to organize into unions and to bargain over wages, health care and other benefits. Quality education for all children is also of utmost importance to Senator Obama.

The CBTU consists of members from 75 national and international unions, with 42 chapters across the country. CBTU seeks to fulfill the dream of the black trade-unionists, both living and deceased, who have courageously and unrelentingly struggled to build a national movement *to bring all our strengths and varied talents to bear in the unend-*

ing effort to achieve economic, political and social justice for every American.

Some of CBTU's basic objectives are:

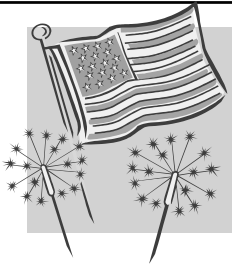
- ☉ Improve economic development and job opportunities for black workers.

You can make a change in 2008!!

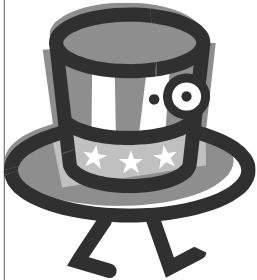
