Brothers & Sisters, we often find ourselves thinking about the hired contractors that Pratt chooses to use, work that used to be done by our Brothers and Sisters. These members were paid a good living wage and held the pride of being a Local 1746 member and as a Pratt & Whitney employee. The work these contractors do is usually performed by low-paid vendors who often don't supply us with the type of quality service we have come to expect from our own membership. There are many examples. Our caring and knowledgeable IFSOA union guards were replaced with a revolving door of security contractors. Our underpaid contractor shipping well attendants now pack & unpack our expensive aircraft parts and goods in place of our experienced 901 union members. Our supply cribs are run by a vendor company who, for their own profit, don't meet the needs of our members or stock fewer quality versions of items we use daily. You get what you pay for.

Through the Letter 22 process outlined in our Collective Bargaining Agreement (CBA) our union leadership and the company leadership meet on a regular basis to discuss the outsourcing and subcontracting of work in East Hartford. We have had success through this Letter 22 process. Many years ago we used to have our own Facility & Services

(F&S) Hoist Department, but Pratt unwisely decided to subcontract all our hoist work to a low-wage vendor. After years of inadequate oversight on what the vendor was supposed to do and how they maintained their operating certifications, they left a hoist ungrounded and almost hurt a member. Through the Health & Safety investigation process, one outcome was to bring back our own F&S Hoist department. They will do our hoist inspections and repairs. It's great to see a department return to the shop with good union jobs. Welcome F&S Dept 25 Hoist Maintenance Group, Larry Bozzuto, Dan Ouellette, Cesar Vasquez, Fran Berardi, Alex St. Laurent.



LL 1746 Hosts ConnectiCOSH Event for 2nd Straight Year

Our Local hosted another successful Health and Safety Conference occurred Friday October 20. Approximately 60 participants arrived and enjoyed a "Swap Meet" of things going well—or not going well—in our work places from a safety perspective. Some of the unions in attendance were IAM workers from Pratt & Whitney and Electric Boat, Sikorsky Teamsters, CEU workers from

the CT DOT, and USPS workers, to name a few. After the Swap Meet, it was breakout sessions with workshops entitled Overworked And Underpaid; Excavation and Trenching; Worker's Comp: To Settle or Not to Settle; HITEC: Health Improvement Through Employee Control; Heat: How Federal OSHA is addressing this "Hot Topic"; and Chemical Hazards on the Roads, Off the Rails or in the Workplace.

IAM International Announces 2024 Scholarship Competition

The IAM International has announced the return of the 2024 Scholarship Competition and encourages its members and their children to apply. The scholarships are open to any active IAM member and the children of any active or retired IAM member who are graduating high school in 2024. Scholarships are to make possible the attainment of a bachelor's degree or a two-year vocational/technical certification.

Members may earn \$2,000 per academic year for a total of \$4,000. Applicants must have two years of continuous membership in the IAM at the closing date of the competition. They may apply either as an incoming freshman or at a later point in their academic career, and they may apply as a full-time or part-time student. Members who do not win may apply again in future competitions.

Children of members may receive \$1,000 per academic year for a total of \$4,000 toward a bachelor's degree, or \$2,000 per academic year for a two-year vocational/technical certification. Last year, the IAM awarded \$64,000 in scholarship awards, including the prestigious Raymond Mayfield scholarship, awarded to the recipient who "best represents the spirit of volunteerism and the keen sense of service to the community that was the hallmark of Brother Mayfield."
