Clearly, the most significant event for Connecticut Operations in 2025 was the strike back in May. We learned a lot about RTX in those 23 days we were out (hard to believe an organization could make us miss UTC), but we also learned a lot about our union brothers and sisters, our solidarity, and our communities. A handful of misguided souls turned their backs on us to polish the apple for management, but that number was far less than what we endured in the 2001 strike, and the strength of our younger generations standing up to the Corporation was a heartening sight for more seasoned workers to behold. Unfortunately, we didn't get everything we wanted, but we sent a message about our unity that will resonate for years to come.

In June, Governor Lamont shocked no one when he vetoed the Unemployment Benefits for Striking Workers for the second time at the behest of his billionaire buddies, but it was a slap in the face of union members who knocked on thousands of doors to help get him elected. Back in November, after months of hemming and hawing, he finally announced he was going to seek a third term for governor. Evidently the polls are telling him he's a shooin, but polls can change and polls can be wrong, and time will tell if he somehow manages to get Labor's endorsement or if he can win without it.

The Local held its own elections for three-year Executive Board positions. President Howard Huestis was re-elected without opposition, and Vice-President Geronimo Valdez was elected after a member who was nominated to run against him chose not to run. Teesha Grant was also re-elected as Recording Secretary without opposition, while **Taylor Salman** will take over as Secretary-Treasurer unopposed. (Thanks for your service, Brother Joe Swain!) John Hanusovsky will take over as Conductor-Sentinel, while the previous C-S Steve McLaughlin will take John's position as Trustee, along with James Bullock and **Jackie Taylor**, who also were not opposed. In fact, the only positions that required elections were for Shop Committee, with eight people running for four positions. The results of last Friday's election named Vinny Perugini, Bob Johnson, Ryan Tyrol, and Jackie Taylor as our next Shop Committee for a three-year term. Congratulations to all who won, and a special thanks to everyone who ran for office. Elections for CT State Council of Machinists, New England Labor Federation, and Greater Hartford Labor Coalition have been postponed until the January meeting.

On behalf of President Huestis and the Executive Board, *Insight* would like to thank the membership for all the donations of time, money, and goods throughout the year, as well as those who contributed in making this newsletter a success. For those of you retiring at the end of the year, we wish you a long and happy retirement with many endearing memories. For those of you returning in 2026, we extend wishes for a safe and healthy holiday season, and look forward to seeing you in the new year with renewed vigor, for there is much work to be done and many challenges to meet in the months ahead.


